

Advanced Diploma of Translating and Interpreting C6067

RMIT's translating and interpreting programs are approved by the National Accreditation Authority for Translators and Interpreters (NAATI). NAATI is the national body for accrediting translators and interpreters in Australia. Graduates of the Advanced Diploma of Translating and Interpreting, when achieving certain levels of grades, will get NAATI accreditation(s) on top of the academic award.

This program trains students to NAATI professional level of accreditation in

- Dialogue interpreting, sight translation and consecutive interpreting
- Translation from English into LOTE (Language other than English), and
- Translation from LOTE into English

WHAT ARE THE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR LOCAL APPLICANTS?

Prerequisite: Units 3 and 4 English (any).
Successfully passing the bilingual intake test.

WHAT LANGUAGES ARE OFFERED IN 2011?*

Full-time stream: Japanese, Korean and Mandarin
Part-time stream: Arabic, Bosnian, Cantonese, Greek, Italian, Macedonian, Polish, Somali, Urdu and Vietnamese

* Note: minimum class number of 20 applies to all language groups.

HOW MANY CONTACT HOURS PER WEEK ARE THERE?

Full-time groups have 20 contact hours per week (two semesters), and are recommended to undertake at least 10 hours of extra study and research weekly.
Part-time groups have 8 contact hours per week (four semesters).

ARE EVENING CLASSES AVAILABLE?

Classes are normally scheduled during business hours on weekdays. Due to teacher availability, some classes might be scheduled in the evening or weekends.

WILL I REQUIRE EXTRA MATERIALS AND HOW MUCH DO THEY COST?

You may need to purchase some materials for some classes. They will be prescribed in the course guide for each subject and are available from the RMIT Bookshop.

DO I NEED MY OWN COMPUTER OR ANY OTHER SPECIAL EQUIPMENT?

You need to be computer literate and have access to an internet-connected computer when doing your studies and research. RMIT has computer facilities available for all enrolled students.
